

Research Background & Objectives

- This report presents the findings from an opinion poll of farmers (and farm dwelling spouses.)
- 570 were interviewed at a series of Agricultural Shows between July and August. Interviewing was undertaken as follows by B&A interviewers.



Respondents were required to work or live on a farm. All were interviewed at Agricultural Shows in July and August 2013.


Findings



More than 3 in 4 have livestock, and for almost 3 in 5 it is their principal activity. Few admit to significant involvement in more peripheral types of farming activity.










37% of those who earn an income off the farm say that it (the off-farm income) is their primary source of income. For 45% of them, farming is still their primary income source.



Most don't foresee significant change in their holdings but a sizeable number would like to expand their farms and particularly those in tillage and dairy.






Many young farmers are eager to expand.




Most intend for farms to stay in direct family ownership.




Most feel that bad weather was at the root of the fodder crisis – few blame others for this (although many admit that there may have been overstocking).



Credit refusals low: higher in 'other' types of farms.




Scale of Anticipated Growth in Food Output by 2020







With 3 in 10 undecided Fine Gael still have a commanding lead. Excluding those undecided, current FG support would stand at 54% to 26% for FF.

Vote in Last General Election

Support for Fine Gael much stronger in last election, with the vast majority claiming to have voted.



What is happening with the Fine Gael and Fianna Fail Vote?

63% voted for Fine Gael last time.

4 61% of them will vote for them again (or 38% of all voters)

5% will switch to Fianna Fail (or 3% of all voters)

4% will switch to Independents & others (or 2% of all voters)

2% will switch to Sinn Fein (or 1% of all voters)

\$\text{1% will switch to Labour} \tag{\text{or less than }\frac{1}{2}\text{% of voters}}

28% are undecided (or 18% of all voters)

21% voted Fianna Fail last time

69% of them will vote for them again (or 15% of all voters)


24% of them are undecided (or 5% of all voters)




Satisfaction with the Minister is broadly very high: his excellent/good score runs at double O'Cuiv's.




7 in 10 have broadband at this stage, and a third a smartphone.



Significant Cutbacks x Age










Agreement is broad and stronger among small holders.










The vast majority are happy with their lot: about 1 in 10 would have preferred a different path.






Almost 2 in 3 feel that women are undervalued (as high as 3 in 4 among spouses.)








Little optimism than the banking crisis will lead to the imposition of jail sentences.



Mass going remains very high. 47% of U35s say they attend weekly.







- There is significant optimism among farmers at present:
 - Almost 4 in 5 optimistic about both farming and their sector.
 - 34% would like to increase their holding and a quarter think that this will probably happen.
 - Seven in ten (76%) hope to keep their farm in their immediate family.
 - 4 in 5 (79%) wouldn't change their life/occupation if they had a second chance.
- However, 57% are not making large purchases and aspects like eating out (27%) and going to the pub (21%) or taking holidays (21%) have been cut back. Only 6% have been refused credit.
- Heavy Fine Gael emphasis remains.
 - 63% voted for them in the last election but just 37% definitely would now while 31% are currently undecided.
 - However, farmers are political and the vast majority vote.
 - \$ 53% feel Simon Coveney doing an excellent or good job, and 29% the same in relation to Eamon O'Cuiv.
 - Fianna Fail might get 21% now, and achieved a reported 18% last time.

- 62% feel that Agricultural policies are a key concern but many are also motivated by more everyday and general issues.
 - Cost of living 50%
 - Unemployment 49%
 - Austerity/debt 48%
 - Emigration 38%
- 47% have off-farm income with 23% of farmers actually having another job themselves: more likely in livestock or other types of farming.
- Farmers work an average of 48 hours a week but as many as 55 hours in Dairying.
 - 7 in 10 rely on the Single Farm Payment as a primary or secondary source of income
 - Most blame the weather for the fodder crisis but overstocking also a key factor (and few seem to blame the advise of others)



- Farmers are considerate and much less traditional in their mindset than heretofore
 - 56% oppose the Healy Rae suggestion on drink driving and just 43% support it
 - 63% would favour limited abortion if a mothers life is at risk while 20% would oppose it
 - * 63% feel women are undervalued while 28% disagree
- Nonetheless, they remain quite traditional in some regards
 - A substantial majority are weekly mass-goers, and there is division on the continuing influence of the Catholic Church: 52% feel that it is strong whereas 37% disagree
- Large majorities doubt that anyone will be jailed as a result of the banking crisis, think that rural dwellers should be allowed arm themselves, and feel that we have far too many politicians.
