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# Technical Appendix

### **Technical Appendix**

- The results of this opinion poll are based upon a representative sample of 912 eligible
   Irish voters aged 18 years +.
- As such, the results can be deemed to be accurate to within plus or minus 3.3 percentage points at the 95% confidence level.
- Fieldwork was conducted on an in-home, face-to-face basis over the period 5<sup>th</sup> 15<sup>th</sup> June, 2015.
- The sample was stratified across constituencies at 125 locations in the country with individuals selected for interview by way of Demographic Quotas (age, gender, socioeconomic status) in line with Central Statistics Office (CSO) and market research industry population estimates.



### **Technical Appendix**

- The subsequent survey results are weighted to reflect the known demographic profile of Irish adults, utilising the most recently published census population estimates from the Central Statistics Office (CSO).
- Party support levels are subsequently realigned in accordance with a technical adjustment factor, designed to smooth the effects of extreme highs and lows in support levels for individual parties as measured at a single point in time, and taking variable election day turnout levels into account.
- All aspects of the survey, including the Party Support adjustment factor, are implemented in accordance with the technical and ethical guidelines set down by the Association of Irish Market Research Organisations (AIMRO) and the European Society of Opinion & Market Research (ESOMAR).

### **Party Support Adjustment Factor: Technical Note**

- Predicting election results on the basis of poll data is not an exact science. All the
  evidence shows that support for individual parties can swing dramatically in the period
  between elections- very often outside the bounds of historic election results.
- What to do in these circumstances? Most polling companies in Britain and Ireland publish their raw survey results as an index of fluctuations in the emotional mood of voters. They also build in an adjustment based on a number of factors. Where we have reports of how people voted in the last general election as well as how they intend to vote in the next one we can use these data to model the likely level of swing from the last election results.
- We then add back in the forecasts of voters who have not voted last time or do not answer that particular question.
- Finally we take into account each individuals stated likelihood of voting in a forthcoming General Election.
- This is the basis of the adjusted voting forecast in Behaviour & Attitudes polls.



# Commentary

### **Background**

Fieldwork for today's poll was conducted over the period 5<sup>th</sup> – 15<sup>th</sup> of June last. As such, surveying took place just one month after our last poll, the results of which indicated a consolidation of the Government party's uplift in support which had originally registered in March of this year.

The reasonably healthy support levels for both Fine Gael and Labour in May were attributed to a run of good news in the run-up to the survey, including statements by Michael Noonan about likely tax reductions in the end of year budget, perhaps even stretching to a cut in the Universal Social Charge.

Since then, the socio-political landscape has been a little rockier, with the Government accused in some quarters of deferring any potential fall-out from the Site Serve controversy until after the election by way of the establishment of a formal enquiry.

There have also been rumblings of industrial unrest in recent weeks with, for example, thousands of Dunnes Stores workers and supporters protesting at Merrion Square last Saturday, 6<sup>th</sup> June in support of improved pay and working conditions.

Crucially, a series of consumer confidence surveys and associated economic reports point towards a clear and persistent divide between urban and rural Ireland in relation to the economic recovery, with rural communities in particular still suffering from the consequences of the recession.



### **Background**

Meanwhile, media commentary throughout the fieldwork period was heavily flavoured with coverage of the acute possibility of a Greek Euro exit, and the potentially disastrous effect this could have on an open economy like Ireland's.

All of the above dynamics would suggest an electorate which is increasingly weary of waiting for the benefits of the economic recovery to reach themselves and their families, at a time when all the indications are that we are facing into a further period of global economic uncertainty.

Fine Gael and Labour might, of course, have expected an electoral bounce following the passing of the marriage equality referendum by a significant margin.

In reality, both Fianna Fáil and Sinn Féin managed to garner their share of the limelight in the hours and days following the referendum result, perhaps best exemplified by the images of Micheál Martin and Gerry Adams broadcast nationwide from Dublin Castle as the results rolled in.

Indeed, the last few weeks have generally been good ones for Fianna Fáil in general. Apart from benefitting, at least in part, from the post-referendum feel-good factor, the party was of course successful in the Carlow Kilkenny by-election held on the same day.



### **Background**

The result of that by-election saw Bobby Aylward of Fianna Fáil capture 28% of the first preference vote, taking the seat on the ninth count ahead of Fine Gael's David Fitzgerald.

This win may prove to be more significant in the longer term than it initially appears. It was the first by-election win for Fianna Fáil since 1996, and the first time Fianna Fáil gained a seat from Fine Gael since the Donegal-Leitrim by-election exactly 45 years ago.

Fianna Fáil will be hoping that this victory will mark a turning point in the party's fortunes, as time begins to run out prior to the looming General Election.



#### **Party Support and Leader Satisfaction Levels**

In today's poll, Government satisfaction has slipped (albeit statistically insignificantly) to 28%, bringing it back to the average Government satisfaction rating which prevailed throughout all of 2014.

With two-thirds of the electorate actively dissatisfied with the manner in which the Government is running the country, the opposition has still therefore a significant opportunity to maximise its share of the vote come election day.

Over the last number of polls, half of all Labour supporters have indicated they are unhappy with the Government's performance, although this can presumably be attributed in large part to a perception amongst Labour apparatchiks that they are not receiving enough credit for recent economic improvements.

Government dissatisfaction remains highest amongst the blue collar working C2DE socioeconomic group, and in areas outside the large cities.

A similar pattern pertains when we review Enda Kenny's personal satisfaction rating as Taoiseach, with his rating registering at an average of just 29% over the last eight months.

Leader satisfaction ratings for Joan Burton, Gerry Adams and Eamon Ryan are practically identical to those measured last month.



#### **Party Support and Leader Satisfaction Levels**

Micheál Martin's standing as leader of Fianna Fáil has, however, improved significantly by five percentage points – the only party leader who has registered a significant uplift. Notwithstanding that, Martin's satisfaction rating of 40% today is merely on a par with his Summer/Autumn 2014 level – its real significance is that his ongoing slide in popularity has finally been arrested.

Most encouragingly for the Soldiers of Destiny, however, is the increase in Fianna Fáil party support to 21% following 12 months (May 2014 – May 2015) stuck on an average 18%. 21% brings the party back up to its average support level of March 2013 to April 2014, when Fianna Fáil and Fine Gael were tussling for top spot alongside the Independent bloc.

An analysis of those sections of the electorate driving this increase in Fianna Fáil support is revealing. Specifically, the party's support has improved particularly so amongst working class C2DEs and residents outside the main urban areas. In other words, the disenfranchised non-urban ordinary worker who continues to suffer despite the promises of better things to come.

In addition to this dynamic, it is a fact that practically all of Fianna Fáil's improvement is accounted for by those aged 55 years + - that very constituency which grew up when Fianna Fáil was at the height of its populist power, and when its natural level of support stood at in or around 40%.



#### **Support for Introduction of Abortion**

Finally, the Sunday Times/Behaviour & Attitudes Social issues tracker continues this month with an update on levels of support for the introduction of abortion in Ireland under specific circumstances.

Results in this regard are on a par with those of January 2013 and October 2014. Specifically, when the undecideds are excluded, support for abortion where fatal foetal abnormality precludes survival currently stands at 84% (83% in 2014 and 84% in 2013), with support for abortion where pregnancy results from rape or incest currently 81% excluding the undecideds (80% in 2014 and 79% in 2013).

The proportion of undecideds has, however, increased in relation to both issues, a trend which in itself is indicative of marginally more consideration being given to the matter by voters.

Undoubtedly, the final percentage of voters who would support abortion, even in these specific circumstances, would reduce from these very high numbers in the event of what would undoubtedly be a heated campaign, although both amendments would likely still be passed.
